


SYMBOLS OF ENGLAND

The oak is the national tree of England



SYMBOLS OF Scotland Capital City: Edinburgh


Cross of St Andrew



On the right it is supported by the Unicorn of Scotland. (The unicorn is chained because in mediaeval times a free unicorn was considered a very dangerous beast (only a virgin could tame a unicorn)

The national flower of Scotland is the thistle
