zero conditional

 We use the so-called zero conditional when the result of the condition is always true, like a scientific fact.

If you heat ice it melts.

- The important thing about the zero conditional is that the condition always has the same result.
- We often use <u>when</u> instead of <u>if</u>, for example:

When I get up late, I miss my bus.

We can use <u>unless=if</u> (<u>I/he/you</u>)don't/doesn't +V1

<u>Unless</u> he asks you politely, refuse to do any more work on the project.

first conditional

- for real possibility
- We are thinking about a particular condition in the future, and the result of this condition. There is a real possibility that this condition will happen.
- If it rains, I will stay at home.
- Sometimes, we use <u>shall</u>, <u>can or may</u> instead of <u>will</u>.
 - If it's sunny this afternoon, we can play tennis.

if +Present Simple, will + base verb
