Many festivals and holidays in Britain are very old. Every town, village in Britain has its own traditions, some of them are carefully planned.

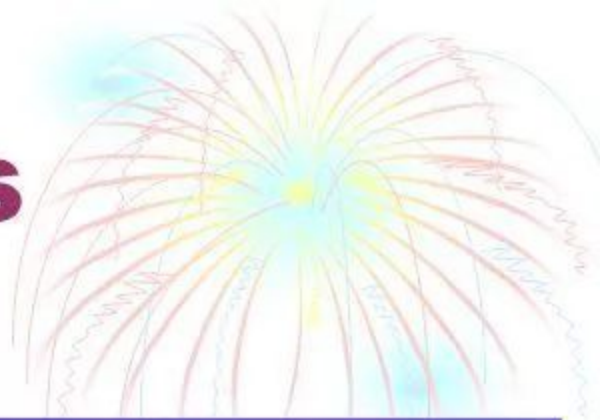


Christmas Tree

Santa Claus

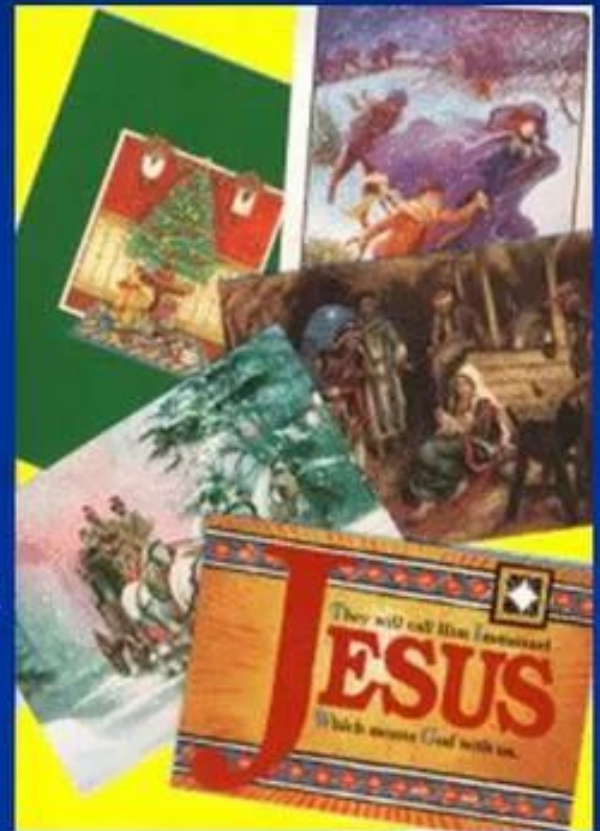


Santa Claus, also called Santa, Father Christmas (in Britain), or Kriss Kringle (in America) is an imaginary old man in red clothes and with a long white beard.
