Westminster Abbey, formally titled the Collegiate Church of St Peter at Westminster, is a large, mainly Gothic church in the City of Westminster, London, located just to the west of the Palace of Westminster. It is one of the most notable religious buildings in the United Kingdom and has been the traditional place of coronation and for **English** and, burial site later, **British** monarchs.

The church of **St Margaret, Westminster Abbey**, is situated in the grounds of <u>Westminster</u>
Abbey on <u>Parliament</u>
Square, and is the <u>Anglican</u>
parish church^[1] of the <u>House of Commons of</u>
the <u>United Kingdom</u> in London. It is dedicated to <u>Margaret of Antioch</u>.



Big Ben is the nickname for the Great Bell of the clock at the north end of the Palace of Westminster in London,[1] and often extended to refer to the clock and the clock tower.[2]

The tower is officially known as the Elizabeth Tower, renamed as such to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of Elizabeth II (prior to being renamed in 2012 it was known as simply "Clock Tower")



The London Eye is a giant Ferris
wheel on the South Bank of the River
Thames inLondon. Also known as
the Millennium Wheel, its official name
was originally published as the British
Airways London Eye, then the Merlin
Entertainments London Eye, then
the EDF Energy London Eye. Since
mid-January 2015 it has been known in
branding as the Coca-Cola London Eye,
following an agreement signed in
September 2014.
