Charles Perrault penned his famous version of the tale "Le Petit Chaperon Rouge" in 1697.



Little Red Riding Hood became popular with **English language** readers in the middle of the 19th century when the fairy tales of the **Brothers Grimm took** Victorian England by storm.

The puzzle is why the girl's name is "Little Red Riding <u>Hood</u>", not "<u>cap</u>" or "<u>hat</u>", in English variant.
